Changing Times

Dear Church:

I wanted to begin this month's note to you in this way as a reminder to us all that we continue to be the church, the body of Christ, even when we cannot gather at the church, the building on Penn Street. I have heard our current situation described in different ways, but one that rings true to me is this: the church is not empty or closed—the church has been deployed. We have not stopped doing what the church does; we have merely started doing it differently.

Let me applaud the efforts of all of those who have helped transition us from a community that is able to gather together weekly for worship, study, work, and fellowship to a community in exile. Our Council, committees, and others have learned how to meet remotely, many using technologies that are new to them. Concerned disciples have volunteered to phone those who are not connected to us digitally. Our musicians have been flexible in their willingness to play in an empty sanctuary or to a video camera. Our non-internet users have graciously accepted printed materials to use on their own at home, continuing in solidarity with the congregation even when they cannot participate in the virtual services. Staff and volunteers have staggered their time in the building to safely tend to both the business operations of the organization and building maintenance. Those who are able have continued to make financial contributions to our ongoing ministry by mail or online.

And let me emphasize that every person who has stayed home when given the option between self-isolating and venturing out for nonessential purposes has done their Christian duty by protecting the most vulnerable among us, just as Jesus taught his followers to do.

It's not perfect, but God's church has overcome imperfect situations before; we know that's true because the church survived to pass the faith on to us. As Paul reminds us, "...neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation [even the coronavirus] will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." [Romans 8:38-39 NRSV—I added the coronavirus part]

Thank you for proving Paul right so far. Hang in there until this church can celebrate at church again.

To the Congregations of St. Matthew & Zion Lutheran Churches:

For everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven.

The time has come for us to share with you that after much struggle, thoughtful consideration, prayer, and trusted counsel, we have decided that the healthiest thing we can do for ourselves and each other is to separate and begin the process of divorce. We have not weathered well some of the storms that we have encountered together, and that has caused great hurt and irreconcilable brokenness between us. This is the path we feel gives us the best opportunity for healing and wholeness as individuals.

We both intend to remain in the service of the congregations to which we have been called, and therefore plan to work together as colleagues in the Allegheny Synod, which has always been home to us both. Because we want to remain respectful of each other professionally, and because in this tense and emotional time it is particularly challenging for us to "speak well of each other and interpret everything each other does in the best possible light" as Luther's catechism would have us understand the eighth commandment, we would appreciate you helping us to protect each other's privacy by not asking us to elaborate on the specific circumstances that have brought us to this point.

We have occasionally heard members mention our absence at each other's congregational events. This actually has had very little to do with our personal issues and much more to do with the fact that the two congregations often have activities scheduled simultaneously, and we simply cannot be in two places at the same time. Each of us recognizes both congregations to be faithful communities of worship and service, and we hope that when the occasion arises, those of you who are involved in synodical and inter-congregational events will welcome the opportunity to work with us both.

As for practical matters, Pastor Traci is in the process of buying a new home and will be moving from the parsonage at Zion, likely within the next month. Our beloved dog Otto, who has become a familiar face in both congregations, will be sharing time in each of our homes. We each are being well cared for in professional counseling and by our mutual ministry staff support committees. Bishop Rhyne is aware of our situation and has offered his support.

We are resurrection people, and we believe that even out of death God can bring new life. Thank you in advance for your prayers and support in this time of transition.

HOW TO DO VIRTUAL WORSHIP ON SUNDAYS

10:30 AM — St. Matthew Facebook Page — Prelude & Opening Hymn (see below) ~10:40 AM — St. Matthew Facebook Page — Service of the Word Live with Pastor Traci ~11:15 AM — Zoom — Postlude & Closing Hymn (see below) & Virtual Coffee Hour

Dr. Smith will be pre-recording the prelude and opening hymn for you to sing at home. The hymn is in this bulletin and you will find the music provided for you in a video on St. Matthew's Facebook Page beginning at 10:30 AM. As soon as that video hymn is over, Pastor Traci will begin the spoken service live on St. Matthew's Facebook page—if you follow St. Matthew or are on our Facebook page listening to the prelude and opening hymn video, you will be alerted when the live broadcast begins. At the end of the live service, you are invited to meet on **Zoom (directions below)** to hear the postlude *and then* the closing hymn. This will allow you to see other members, be seen, and talk to one another. **Please sing the last hymn with your microphone MUTED; the time lag in the video conference is significant enough that unison singing along with Dr. Smith will not be possible and will cause a digital cacophony.** *After* **the closing hymn, you are welcome to stay and turn on your microphone to greet one another through the video conferencing. A note about the bulletin: to conserve paper, the citations for the readings are included but not printed out; if you want to follow along, have your bible handy. It is our hope that this format will better allow us to share Dr. Smith's gift of music, provide a more interactive gathering experience, and still allow those who are not using Zoom to hear the Word.** *We are trying many new things these days and hoping some of it works. Let us know how it goes!*

How to Use Zoom

Zoom is a video conferencing tool that allows you to meet with a group, seeing and hearing in real time (less a split second lag). You can use Zoom on your desktop, laptop, tablet/iPad, or smartphone. You may also use a conventional landline or cell phone to dial in and listen (and speak) without the video (this is free on Zoom's end but may be at cost to you depending on your phone plan). Here is how you Zoom:

For a desktop or laptop computer: Go to **zoom.us** and click on the "Sign up for free" button. Follow the prompts to sign up using your email and download the application to your computer. *Zoom is free to you.*

For a tablet/iPad/smartphone: In your App store, find and download the Zoom app. (When you search, there will be multiple Zoom and Zoom-like apps. You want the one that is titled "ZOOM Cloud Meetings" with a blue and white icon of a video camera.) *Zoom is a free app*.

For calling in on your phone: You will see a list of "Dial In Numbers" from which you can choose. "It does not matter which number you use (New York, Houston, whatever)." If one is busy, try another. If you have unlimited minutes on a cell plan or if you have free long distance calling on a landline, these numbers would be free; otherwise you would pay according to your phone plan. If you are able to mute your phone when you call in, please do so until you are ready to speak so that we do not hear background noise. Those who are participating by video will "see you" represented by a phone number and will probably ask during the meeting who is calling from your number…Let us know!

When you are ready to join a meeting, open your app or application on your computer and join the meeting using the Meeting ID. For St. Matthew's meetings "hosted" by Pastor Traci, the Meeting ID will always be <u>596 621 1441</u>. When you join, you will have to give the application permission to use your camera and microphone. You may also choose to join without video or to use a still picture to represent you. When you join, please mute your microphone until you are ready to speak.

You may set your Zoom screen to Gallery View (which allows you to see other participants in little windows—it looks like the intro to The Brady Bunch or Hollywood Squares) or to Speaker View (which makes the person actively speaking very large on your screen with just a few other participants in small squares on the side). If a large number of people sign on to the meeting, you will have multiple "pages" of participants that you can scroll through to see a limited number of people at once. This size of your monitor and device will limit the number of people you can see at any one time. This may sound overwhelming, but several committees and Council have already met using Zoom. The following is from the by-laws of the Third Century Fund and outline the guidelines for fund requests.

PURPOSE

The St. Matthew Evangelical Lutheran Church Mission Endowment Fund is established to encourage responsible Christian stewardship and to promote the mission of the congregation. In response to God's love and mercy, the Endowment Fund seeks to enhance and expand the mission outreach objectives of St. Matthew Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Members and friends of St. Matthew congregation are encouraged to practice responsible Christian Stewardship by making contributions to the Endowment Fund. There are a variety of ways such gifts can be made such as, Cash, Securities, Bequests through wills or living trusts, Life insurance policies, charitable gift annuity and Life estates.

The Endowment Fund provides financial support for the church in a manner that is separate from the expenditures normally funded by the annual operating budget of the congregation,

USE OF THE FUND

All contributions to the St. Matthew Lutheran Church Endowment Fund will be undesignated and added to the principal balance of the fund. The Endowment fund principal balance will be retained and only the dividend income will be used for annual disbursements.

Consideration for awarding fund requests will be given by using the following guidelines.

- 1. Youth of all ages- scholarship support of congregational members and their children; for youth events, for church camps or similar Christian programs and education.
- 2. Christian outreach ministries and missions of St. Matthew Lutheran Church, its members and the ELCA.
- 3. Worship and music support for the worship of St, Matthew.
- 4. Capital Projects- major renovations or building projects of St. Matthew.
