Gospel: Luke 2:1-20

The holy gospel according to Luke, the second chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. ²This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. ³All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

⁸In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger."

¹³And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, ¹⁴"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom God favors!"

¹⁵When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." ¹⁶So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. ¹⁷When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; ¹⁸and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

Homily

Since this year has been backwards in so many ways, it is perhaps fitting that I am here in our lovely but empty sanctuary, where there is plenty of space for whomever would want to be here, retelling the story of the holy family finding no room in the inn. For many reasons, not the least of which being that we can't meet together this night, this Christmas will not be the holiday that most of us would envision or want. But, just as months ago we declared that this was the Lentiest Lent we could imagine, this simple celebration of the birth of Christ might be exactly what we need to hear the story of God's love again in a new way.

When the pastors met for Bible study this week, we got to talking about how the nativity is usually portrayed in artwork—with the characters clean and composed, serene and statuesque, in flowing robes with gilded halos glowing behind their heads. Pastor Ed remembered hearing how difficult it is for people in developing nations with poor sanitation and fewer medical resources to reconcile those fancy pictures with the circumstances described in Luke's gospel. The truth is that we don't like to think about the indignities of Jesus' birth; we are uncomfortable with the inn being full, the travelers being turned out into the cold, the baby being laid in a feeding trough. We want to sanitize the scene and bring Jesus in out of the cold. It's almost as if we forget that God could have chosen any time and any place to enter into the human story, from the poshest palace to the most well-equipped maternity ward in the finest modern hospital.

But instead, God chose this: to be born to travelers far from their home, with no modern comforts or conveniences, and to announce this birth first to shepherds, who themselves were wandering without the comfort of shelter and a home. Who are we to polish the rough edges from God's work?

All throughout Advent we talk about preparing for the coming of the Lord. If it were up to us, we would have chosen better for the birth of Jesus this year. We would have decked the halls and lit the candles; we would have worn Christmas sweaters and gathered to sing carols. We would have opened the doors wide to welcome God here to this house of worship. But God comes to us anyway. It was not into extraordinary or carefully prepared or ideal circumstances that Jesus was born. Knowing that the human experience can be a fierce struggle, God chose to enter into that struggle right from the very beginning. It was on the people who lived in deep darkness that God's light shined.

And so it is for us. Although we are missing much of what makes Christmas feel like Christmas, still, God has come to us, right where we are, because that is where we need God to be. If the shepherds could find the Christ child in a lowly manger, we, too, can find God beyond our expectations, lighting up this dark place where we find ourselves. Thanks be to Emmanuel, God with Us, who truly is with us, wherever we are.


