Dear People of God:

Precisely in our distress, in our dislocation, the Lord shows up. Emmanuel—God with us—makes his home in the very places we find foreign or isolating.



The room was spare and dimly lit. We sat on folding chairs in a circle—young Honduran women and some of us from the ELCA. We had come to Honduras to observe the work of AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities). This is the ELCA's strategy to help youth who have been forced to flee their home countries because of violence, abuse, extortion by gangs and extreme poverty. *Amparo* is the Spanish word for shelter or refuge.

In this case, AMMPARO partnered with the Lutheran World Federation and the Mennonites to resettle returned migrants—those who had tried to seek asylum in the United States but had failed or had been denied and deported back to Honduras.

One by one they told us their stories of fear and desperation. Not a one undertook the long and dangerous trek north on a whim. They told us about the abuse they had suffered, about family members who had been killed by gangs, about the inability to make a living because of the extortion by organized crime. They talked about the bitter sadness of leaving home and family, and the uncertainty of the future.

I remember one young woman in particular. She was pregnant when she tried to migrate to the United States. She had the baby somewhere along the way. She was far from home, mostly alone and desperately wanted her mother to be with her. None of this is what she had hoped for when she was growing up. Circumstances beyond her control had forced her into this new and strange existence. She and her baby were now back in Honduras—but not at home. Home was too dangerous.

Remember last Christmas? Remember all of the preparations, the travel to be with family? Remember the holy beauty of the Christmas Eve liturgy and receiving Christ's grace and forgiveness at his table? The shopping and Christmas caroling? The in-person gatherings? All that has changed. The pandemic hasn't forced us from our homes but into our homes, sheltering in place, isolated. Not together, but physically distanced. Not gathered with family and friends but forced apart because of the threat of infection. Forced by circumstances beyond our control into this strange existence. Oh, there will be Christmas carols piped into grocery stores and other essential services, but they will be painful reminders of how life used to be.

We are reminded of the experience of the exiles in Babylon: "By the rivers of Babylon—there we sat down and there we wept when we remembered Zion. On the willows there we hung up our harps. For there our captives asked us for songs, and our tormentors asked for mirth, saying, 'Sing us one of the songs of Zion!' How could we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land" (Psalm 137)?

I told the young Honduran woman about another young woman who was forced to leave home because of a government decree. She, too, was pregnant and made a long and difficult journey. She, too, was far from home and without her mother when the baby came. She had to find shelter wherever she could. This wasn't what she had hoped for when she was growing up. Circumstances beyond her control had forced her into this new existence. That young woman was Mary and the child was Jesus. Precisely in our distress, in our dislocation, the Lord shows up. Emmanuel—God with us—makes his home in the very places we find foreign or isolating. The young Honduran woman, and all of us, can find hope because of the birth of Mary's child. There is no Godforsaken place, and we are never alone—not in hospital rooms, or sheltering in place, or Zoom calls or on dangerous roads.

Many of us will not be physically home for Christmas, but we are truly home in Christ.

Many thanks to you for the cards and prayers for Barry concerning his recent surgery. It has been a comfort to both of us to know that we were being lifted up in prayer. Barry is now home from the hospital and is doing well.



"The People who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness – on them light has shined" (Isaiah 9:2)

700 years before the incarnation of our Lord Jesus, the prophet Isaiah spoke these words to comfort God's people. Isaiah spoke to a people who were under the shadow of invasion from Babylon and who would see Jerusalem destroyed. It was a dark time for the children of Israel.

In those dark days, God's Word proclaimed that hope and salvation are coming. Isaiah is saying that the darkness cannot stop the light of our God. No matter how dark the day, God is bringing light and his salvation into the world.

There have been some days that seemed pretty dark in 2020. We have lived in the shadow of the pandemic. We have seen natural disasters, civil unrest, and political strife. It has left us feeling out of control and that the ground is shifting under our feel.

The Word of God that offered hope to God's people thousands of years ago, has the same message for us today. No matter what darkness or shadow we find ourselves in, God is with us. God will never leave us alone. Our Lord Jesus promises us that he will be with us until the end of the age (Matthew 28:20) and that when he comes again, he will take us to himself (John 14:3). Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus (Romans 8:38-39).

Life can be hard. But we know that the brokenness, the sin, and the darkness of this world does not have the last word. The end of all things is the victory of God in Christ Jesus. The end of all things is the God who is going to cast out the darkness and heal our hearts and mend our souls.

That God is with us now. We celebrate at Christmas that our Lord loved us so much that God would not sit by and watch us suffering. But the Creator of all things became flesh and lived among us. The God who brought all things into being, would not leave us to our suffering. But became flesh and to walk with us so that we might know we are never alone. As we contemplate the baby in the manger, we see the one who is Emmanuel. God with us.

God is with us and that makes all the difference. Christmas celebrates that God would not leave us to our suffering. But he stepped into our existence and our lives to show us a better way. In Jesus we see the way of love. We see the God who would stop and nothing to save us from sin, death and the devil. But also, God goes to any and all lengths to make us his own. We matter to the God who made heaven and earth.

As we look at the brokenness and darkness of this world, let us hear the Word of the Lord through the prophet Isaiah, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." The light of God, Jesus Christ has come into this world. As we look to the manger, and later look to the cross, we remember that Christ Jesus is the light of the world and there is no darkness that can overcome him.

### **Video Technician Position**

St. Matthew Lutheran Church is looking to hire an individual to fill the position of Video Technician effective January 1, 2021. The Video Technician will be responsible to video graph and livestream worship services on three Sundays per month with four Sundays and on four Sundays per month with five Sundays.

Applicants must be technically skillful and proficient with live streaming and video graphing, is capable of trouble shooting any technical problems, and is



knowledgeable on appropriate and up-to-date equipment. Applicants must be compliant with all background/criminal clearances as required by law.

The video technician will be paid \$25 per service. The successful candidate will be trained on the existing equipment. A procedures manual is available for training and operational use.
