Dear People of God:

With songs, parades, and fireworks, America celebrates freedom each July. Although the Declaration of Independence was signed on July 4, 1776, the Revolutionary War continued into the next decade. Of course, any student of American history knows that many other battles—military and political—had to follow so that the unalienable rights which the founders held to be self-evident truths were ensured for *all* people in the nation, not just a fortunate few. Because that freedom is fragile and hard-won, we still guard it vigilantly; it's both a promise and a process that requires ongoing effort.

Freedom means something a little different for Christians. In his 1520 treatise "On Christian Freedom" Martin Luther wrote, "A Christian is the most free lord of all, and subject to none; a Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, and subject to every one." Having been justified through the faithfulness of Christ, we are free from sin and death not because of anything we do but because of God's grace. Yet that freedom does not give us license to ignore God's law; instead we are freed so that we can serve others in the spirit of Christ's selfless love instead of in an effort to earn our salvation.

More than any individual pursuit of happiness, Christian freedom calls us into community and holds us responsible for one another, following the example of Jesus' selfless service to all. It's human nature for us to stay focused ourselves; the baptismal life teaches us to care for those around us. Discipleship, too, is both a promise and process, a life-long struggle to answer God's call.

As we celebrate, among other things, the free exercise of our religion, let us remember what our faith requires: doing justice, loving mercy, and walking humbly with God—not because we have to, but because Christ freed us to do so.

Important Dates of the Allegheny Synod



Friday July 16, 6pm-8 p.m. Farewell for Pastor Becca Ehrlich

Pastor Becca has received a call to serve as the Associate Dean for Community Life at General Theological Seminary (Episcopal) in New York City. She will be starting at General in August. We are holding a drop in to say farewell on Friday July 16^{th} from 6 – 8pm. We will have some light refreshments and will be indoors due to the heat. Some of those who are attending have continuing health issues. We ask that if you are unvaccinated to please wear a mask, or if you are bringing children under 12 that they would mask as well. Vaccinated persons do not need to mask for this event.

Saturday August 28, 2 p.m. - Farewell Liturgy for Bishop Rhyne

We will have a service of Farewell and Godspeed at Evangelical Lutheran in Duncansville starting at 2 on Aug. 28th. Clergy are invited to vest and process. If I were to title what I have to say, I would call it "Hoping to Lose." That doesn't make sense, does it? Who wants to be a loser? Right? The Greek writer, Nikos Kazantsakis, tells a story about young hiker on a Greek island who came across a Christian monk. In their dialogue, the young hiker asks the monk if he still wrestles with the devil. The monk told him in essence that those days were over, but that now he wrestles with God.

That puzzled the hiker, but he quickly asked the monk if he hoped to win? "Heavens no," came the answer. "I hope to lose!" Why lose? ... because it is when we quit trying to put our ego in full charge of our minds, hearts and souls and let God use them for his purposes that we find life truly rich and meaningful. Remember what Jesus said: "Those who lose their life for my sake will find it." (Matthew 10:39) According to Christ, it is those who offer their lives in totality for his sake who ultimately win in everything that truly matters. Every saint who ever lived has testified to that truth. It is in giving our lives without restraint to the Lord that we find true victory. In the 19th century Frances Havergal wrote a hymn that speaks of the commitment each of us should make. Here is the last verse of the hymn to ponder:

Take my will, and make it thine, It shall be no longer mine. Take my heart, it is thine own; It shall be thy royal throne. Take my love; my Lord, I pour at thy feet its treasure-store. Take myself, and I will be ever, only, all for thee. Amen.

Prayer: Dear Lord, help us to see and understand that we will find the blessings of true life only as we surrender all to thee. **Amen**

HIGHLIGHTS BY COUNCIL IN MAY 2021

- Since there will be no local vacation bible school this year, the Christian Ed committee voted to donate \$500 of its vacation bible school budget to On Eagles Wings for their vacation bible school in the Northwest Territories. Members will also be recording bible stories and sending them to On Eagles Wings.
- 4. The social ministry committee is planning a shredding event.
- 5. Reviewed the 2020 annual financial report and noted that giving for 2020 was \$20,000 lower than 2019, and giving for 2021 was \$9,000 lower than 2020 after the first 4 months of this year.
- 6. The search continues for Evangelism chairperson Mike Lamborn is considering the position.
- 7. Defeated by 4 to 8 a motion to start on Sunday, June 20, 2021 worshiping in the sanctuary with an additional outdoor worship service.
- 8. Voted to begin worship in the sanctuary every Sunday at 10:30 a.m. with an additional outdoor service at 9:00 a.m. starting on Sunday, July 4, 2021 through the last Sunday in August. If weather is inclement, outdoor services will be moved to the fellowship hall. Wednesday evening services will be discontinued. On Sunday, August 29, 2021 there will only be one service held at the Kreider Farm.
- 9. The property committee is working on various projects including replacement of the Maple Street doors, lighting throughout the building, and repairs to Cabin 4 at Camp Sequanota.
- 10. There were 12 renewing volunteer and 1 new volunteer updating their child protection requirements at the education sessions on June 6. Another opportunity may be offered in August.
- 11. Jim Barley and Connie Lamborn were thanked for serving as delegates to the virtual Synod Assembly on June 4 and 5.
