#### **Greetings, Beloved People of God:**

My trip to the National Parks ended with a night at the Holiday Inn Express at the Las Vegas Airport. My roommate's early flight required her to leave the hotel around four in the morning, and after saying goodbye, I thought I'd drift back to sleep in the glow of the Vegas strip; so I opened the blackout curtains that we had closed when we went to bed. All the lights were still on, but they weren't just glowing: they were flashing. I could still see them flash even when I closed my eyes. I could still see them flash even when I closed my eyes and rolled over to face the other direction. I got up and closed the blinds again so I could sleep a few more hours.

Normally, when I think theologically about light and darkness, John's gospel comes to mind: *The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.*..But John was speaking of the light of Christ, not the lights of the MGM Grand. Especially after a week in the deep darkness of the canyon, where light pollution is restricted, that Vegas light was toxic: I couldn't rest until I managed to shut it out.

As people of faith, we carry the responsibility of staying informed about the world around us so we can work for justice and act with kindness toward those who are suffering; and right now that's a staggering number of people. It is easy to be overwhelmed by those stories of suffering, more in our age of constant information than ever before.

I am not a huge advocate of "giving up" something for Lent; it's too easy to mistake acts of voluntary deprivation for good works at the very time we are to be contemplating our reliance on God's grace. Yet it's always good to do—or refrain from doing—whatever we need to in order to keep ourselves physically, mentally, and spiritually healthy.

If, like me, you struggle to find peace in the onslaught of bad news, maybe Lent is a good time to periodically, intentionally close the blinds: not for six straight weeks, and not to ignore the very real and very serious problems that are out there, but to take enough time on a regular basis to rest, to pray, and to recharge in order to do the work of the kingdom to which we are called and on which our neighbors depend.


Let us remember what the Bible says about the responsibility of mankind; In Genesis 2:15 we read:

4. Social Ministry Community Outreach




