
Confession and Forgiveness

Gospel: Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23


- ¹That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. ²Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. ³And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. ⁴And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. ⁵Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. ⁶But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. ⁷Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. ⁸Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. ⁹Let anyone with ears listen!"
- ¹⁸"Hear then the parable of the sower. ¹⁹When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. ²⁰As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; ²¹yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. ²²As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. ²³But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

Homily

Two decades ago, the world became enchanted by the Harry Potter series: books and then movies about an orphaned wizard who fought against evil to save the magical world. The first thing that happens when Harry attends wizard boarding school is that he is sorted into one of the four houses within the school. Each house has a motto, mascot, and colors, and the students in it tend to have common personality traits and skills: bravery, loyalty, ambition, creativity, and so forth. It became quite the fad for fans of the series to take internet quizzes to determine which house they would belong to. Most people seem to want to belong with the heroes, not the villains, which is true of how we usually identify with the characters in any kind of fiction, including the stories that Jesus tells his disciples and the crowds to help them understand the kingdom of God.

- There are two kinds of parables that we find in the gospels: one is where Jesus tells a story and leaves it up to our interpretation. The other is where Jesus explains what all the characters and events are supposed to mean. It's more fun, I think, to figure it out ourselves, but this week it's one where Jesus gives us the answer sort of. This is the one about a sower sowing seeds that fall on a path, on rocky ground, among thorns, and on good soil. The seeds produce grain to varying extents depending on the kind of soil in which they were sown. When Jesus explains the parable, the seed is the word of the kingdom and the different qualities of soil describe the openness or not, the retention or not, the endurance or not, the productivity or not of those who are hearing the word. For some it never has the chance to make an impact; some get fired up at first but their enthusiasm wanes; some get distracted or overcome by other things; even those whose hearts are the "good soil" yield a wide range of results.
- So, all we have to do is be the good soil, right? And even aim to be the good soil that produces a hundredfold instead of thirty. Just as we want to be the hero of the story or one of the good guys in the movies, we want to be the high-yield soil, the ones who hear the word of God, take it to heart, and do the good work of living out God's commands, right? So, go ahead and be good soil. Right now, just will yourself to be good, deep, nutrient-rich soil, free from rocks and thorns. Now, I'm not a gardener by any stretch. My friend sent me a planter of succulents because I couldn't keep real plants alive, and I still killed the succulents. Then she sent an air plant and I managed to kill that, too. So I'm no expert, but when was the last time you saw soil improve itself? See, the thing about parables is that we don't always get to choose which part we play. That's why in our hymn today we ask, "Lord, let my heart be good soil..." because we can't control our hearts on our own.
- The truth is that we are sometimes good soil, hundred-fold soil, and sometimes we're the beaten down path. We're not always in a place where the life-giving word of God can speak to us meaningfully, where it can take root and grow and change us so that we produce the good fruit like what is described in Galatians: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self control...And just like the soil can't hydrate itself or fertilize itself or get the rocks and thorns out of itself, we can't always change the conditions of our lives to better prepare us to receive to the word of God. And, by the way, the people around us who frustrate us because they just never seem to get it—there are some circumstances that they can't change, either. But notice that Jesus doesn't call it the parable of the soil; Jesus calls it the parable of the sower. And The Sower, God, scatters seed everywhere, over all types of ground, all the time, generously and abundantly and with abandon. And so should we.

I don't know who said it first, but it was a wise person who pointed out that we're not called to be like other Christians, we're called to be like Christ. Similarly, if we want to find our place in this parable, we're not called to compare ourselves to other kinds of soil and somehow will ourselves to be better like others. We're called to do what God does, to be the sower, to sow the seed, not just where we think it has the best shot of producing the biggest harvest, but everywhere. It's fine if you want to exercise care and caution in your actual garden, making sure you plant seeds in precisely the places where they are likely to grow into the prettiest flowers or tastiest vegetables. But when we're talking about people, the gardener whom we are called to follow doesn't hold back in spreading mercy, love, joy, justice, and forgiveness far and wide and everywhere. Because we may be able to look at actual soil and know how well a seed will thrive, but we never know with people—nor is it our job to judge. Our job is to sow like God has sown for us—always giving us help and care and love and presence whether we're in a place to recognize it, receive it, and respond gratefully to it or not. We simply can't love too much; we can only sow with abundance and abandon and wait for the magic that happens when the seeds of love that we scatter fall on the good soil that God has prepared. May God mercifully prepare us to be good soil, and may we be the hands of God that sow the seeds of the word far and wide.


Eternal God, we give thanks for all who have died. Comfort us in the sure and certain hope of the resurrection. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**
