Gospel: Matthew 14:13-21



But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. ¹⁵When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." ¹⁶Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." ¹⁷They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." ¹⁸And he said, "Bring them here to me." ¹⁹Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds.

²⁰And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. ²¹And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

Homily

Reflection

The primary biblical symbol of the mercy of God is food. In the Exodus story, God sustains the people with manna and water from the rock. In the Psalms, God is praised in this way: "You open wide your hand and satisfy the desire of every living thing." And when the people were in trouble, the prophet Isaiah gave the promise of water, wine, milk, and bread, without price: hunger and thirst, both really and metaphorically, have an answer in God. These stories are part of the stunning inheritance of the Jews, the covenants of mercy, of which Paul speaks. But because of the compassion of Jesus Christ we people of the nations, we people who are right now deeply hungry for hope, are ourselves grafted into the promise of these stories. They are also for us. Turn to God with your hunger for hope. And then, empowered by our bread-giving Lord, we are turned to the needy world around us: "you give them something to eat."

Confident of God's care and upheld by the Spirit, let us pray for all who are in need.

O God our Savior, bless your church around the world. Where believers must be isolated from one another, be present to through your gracious word. Bring an end to racism in our society. our elected officials in how to govern with integrity. Lord, you are good to all: hear our cry and save us.

O God, Storehouse of goodness, visit all who face the coronavirus, especially those who are incarcerated. Give us, O Lord of life, a vaccine. Assist all who face eviction from their residence. Bring wholeness and healing to those who suffer in body or spirit, especially those whom we name here: Lord, you are good to all: hear our cry and save us.

O God, Giver of bread, teach us how to feed the hungry: the children starving in war zones, the families who cannot afford groceries, the homeless on our streets, the farmers devastated by pestilence. Give to all creatures their food in due season. Lord, you are good to all: hear our cry and save us.


O God, Lover of our souls, receive now the petitions of our hearts. Lord, you are good to all: hear our cry and save us.

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Greetings from ALSM!

These times are unprecedented in our world. Never did any of us think we would be faced with dealing with a virus of unknown origin. Frightening times for all of us. I hope all of you to continue to follow precautions that are indicated by the Center for Disease Control (CDC).

As you can imagine, Allegheny Lutheran Social Ministries (ALSM) is experiencing challenges we never thought we would face. While the counties in which our three senior communities are located have gone "green," our communities continue to restrict visitors and screen staff who are tirelessly caring for our residents. Several of our senior daily programs are closed, yet our *ALSM at Home* program continues.

Of course, we are safeguarding our staff team members and our residents by providing Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) so we can continue to respond to regulating body guidelines. The costs of these are one we did not anticipate. We have set up a COVID-19 Fund to assist with extra expenses such as masks and additional cleaning supplies. We expect to spend at least \$100,000 in PPE. We use approximately 2,000 masks a week and 10,000 gloves a week. If we have an active Covid-19 case, we will need the added PPE of shoe covers, N-95 masks, and shoe covers. We have received a supply of face shields from Saint Francis University, so we have not had to purchase those items yet.

ALSM is fortunate to have the dedicated staff who are committed to our mission "to serve people with love, compassion, and mercy."

I invite you to please consider a donation of \$10, \$25, \$50, or \$100 so that we can purchase the equipment we need to keep ALSM safe. An outdoor worship service is planned for Sunday, August 9, 2020 at 10 AM, at the Ed Kreider Farm. Directions to the Kreider Farm are below:

Directions: From Martinsburg, take 164 East to Fredericksburg. Turn **left** on Clover Creek road and follow for 2³/₄ miles to Kreider Lane on the right.

THERE IS NO PICNIC THIS YEAR.

The Worship and Music Committee along with the Re-opening Task Force are working to determine how and when to safely gather for worship in person. Worshiping outdoors will enable members of the congregation to gather with less risk than indoor worship. It will still be necessary for attendees to exercise caution.

Guidelines to follow if you plan to attend worship on August 9:

- --Bring your own chair.
- --Hand sanitizer will be available.
- --No rest room facilities will be available unless for an emergency.
- --The service will not be live streamed, but will be recorded and uploaded shortly after the service is over.
- --Print your bulletin or use electronic device (download and save the file before the service; cell coverage is at a minimum at the farm). If you bring a paper bulletin, take it home with you.
- --You are required to wear a mask. If you are unable to wear a mask, we invite you to continue worshiping on line. (Masks will be available in case you forget yours.)
- --Your name and contact information will be recorded (in case contact tracing becomes necessary).
- --Wear appropriate clothing and shoes so you are comfortable in an outdoor setting.
- --If it rains, the service will be live streamed at the church and recorded as usual. We will not meet in person. Lori will send an email indicating cancellation of the outdoor worship if it is raining.
- --The worship service will include communion. Pre-packaged wafers and wine will be prepared and placed on a table for you to pick up before the worship service. Following the service you can discard packaging in the trash can provided.
- --Practice social distancing. Whenever possible keep at least six feet from anyone who is not part of your own household. We realize it has been a while since most of us have seen each other, but refrain from the urge to hug or shake hands. A simple wave and hello is good.
- --Even though we are gathering outdoors, if you are exhibiting symptoms, awaiting test results, or have been in contact with someone who may have been exposed to the virus, you will need to stay at home. We invite you to worship digitally.

We are looking forward to this unique worship experience.
