First Reading: Exodus 19:2-8a

¹Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all you lands!

²Serve the Lord with gladness; come into God's presence with a song.

- ³⁵Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the dominion of heaven, and curing every disease and every sickness. ³⁶When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. ³⁷Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; ³⁸therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers for the harvesting."
- ^{10:1}Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness. ²These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; ³Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; ⁴Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him.
- ⁵These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: "Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, ⁶but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. ⁷As you go, proclaim the good news, 'The dominion of heaven has come near.' ⁸Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those with leprosy, cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment. [⁹Take no gold, or silver, or copper in your belts, ¹⁰no bag for your journey, or two tunics, or sandals, or a staff; for laborers deserve their food.

- ¹¹Whatever town or village you enter, find out who in it is worthy, and stay there until you leave. ¹²As you enter the house, greet it. ¹³If the house is worthy, let your peace come upon it; but if it is not worthy, let your peace return to you. ¹⁴If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, shake off the dust from your feet as you leave that house or town. ¹⁵Truly I tell you, it will be more tolerable for the land of Sodom and Gomorrah on the day of judgment than for that town.
- ¹⁶"See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves. ¹⁷Beware of them, for they will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues; ¹⁸and you will be dragged before governors and rulers because of me, as a testimony to them and the Gentiles. ¹⁹When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say; for what you are to say will be given to you at that time; ²⁰for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you. ²¹"Brother and sister will betray one another to death, and the parent the child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death; ²²and you will be hated by all because of my name. But the one who endures to the end will be saved. ²³When they persecute you in one town, flee to the next; for truly I tell you, you will not have gone through all the towns of Israel before the Son-of-Man comes."]

Reflection

Surely we as well as our neighbors are among the harassed and helpless that Jesus sees, those with "every disease and every sickness." But, as the baptized, we are also those to whom Jesus has committed his mission, and we have often failed. Nonetheless, God says, "I have brought you to myself." Because of Jesus Christ, forgiveness and love have been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit. Just as the Twelve stand for the Israelites, called to be a people of priests for all the world, we too are given the charge to pray for all and to bear witness to the healing love of God, all of us together Christ's priestly people for the sake of the world.

Called into unity with one another and the whole creation, let us join together to pray for the church, our nation, and for all who are in need.

Uphold health care workers and medical researchers as they work on our behalf. Assist the unemployed in finding a job. Show us how to provide safe housing and daily food for the homeless in our nation and around the world. 
O God, Holy One of mercy, we pray finally also for ourselves. Your steadfast love is everlasting: **Graciously hear our prayer.**

Pastor Vicki's story:

Hi, I am Pastor Vicki Beilfuss of Holy Shepherd Parish in Lanse and Karthaus. This stewardship story actually belongs to my late husband, John.

One spring, he was asked by a member of his church to join their Habitat for Humanity retreat to WVa. It was not long after John and his first wife divorced and his self-esteem and self-worth had sunk. It would cost him between \$100-\$200 and a weekend of his time. So he thought, "Why not?"

Everyone was assigned a task toward the completion of this house for a family with two little girls. His job was pargeting (covering the outside of the foundation with a cement mixture). One daughter of the family decided she wanted to help John. I visualize him rolling his eyes, but he let her help stir the cement. As little girls will do, she peppered him with all kinds of questions and he patiently answered them—if you knew John you'd be laughing at that mental image.

The retreat ended with the crew and family taking time to worship. As they were getting ready to leave, John saw the little girl tug on her father's pant leg and overheard her say, "Look there's John—he built our house!" John's eyes would fill up every time he told this part of the story. What seemed like such a little thing to him, meant so much to this little girl.

This experience started John on his stewardship journey of discovery. It helped him to realize he had gifts to give and gave him the courage to say, "Yes, I will help." I keep a picture John took of this little girl and her sister to remind me of John's generous heart and how generosity can powerfully touch both receiver and giver.

"KELC Flood/Hunger Relief."

These are difficult times for many people, and in the midst of Coronavirus and racial injustice and inequality, some of us feel helpless, not quite knowing what to do.

But there is a situation in which your help could mean saving hundreds of lives. In our companion synod (the Kenya Evangelical Lutheran Church), where they have also been facing many challenges due to Covid-19, unprecedented rainfall has caused two rivers to significantly flood, destroying communities. One of the pastors we have been in communication with has said:

"Community-wise, floods, earthslides, and economy is killing all here. The [two rivers] over-flowed, and carried away houses, foodstuffs, and lives of people. We are living in fear always. Life is miserable. There is no food. Our parish congregants ... all their crops have been swept away. Some parents are boiling stones to confuse children that food is being cooked to make them sleep. ... Even getting for one day a meal, people will appreciate. It's really a delicate situation. We hear cries all over."

We invite you to help us care for our neighbor by providing funds for food and basic life necessities. We are challenging the people of our synod to help us meet a goal of providing food for 1 month for the more than 300 people in the parishes affected by this flooding. Those who receive food supplies also will share with neighbors; which means that our gift could reach even more.

If each congregation in our Synod were to share \$100 (this would be \$20 from 5 members, or \$10 from 10 members), we could easily meet this goal. Will you be one of those people? For those who are able to provide more, I invite you to prayerfully do so. An anonymous donor has already pledged to match the first \$1,000 that comes in.
