Homily

Reflection

"War, famine, and pestilence," prophesied by the ancient prophets, are all around us today. We may wish to listen to people who speak of peace instead. We may long to say "amen" to their promises. But false comfort is worse than no comfort at all. Instead, in a hard time, we who have been baptized into Christ should offer welcome to people who speak the truth and we should offer comfort — "a cup of cold water" — to the least and littlest ones, the ones hurt by these times. The truth-speakers are the very emissaries of God. And the little ones, the vulnerable and unjustly treated ones, are the very presence of Jesus Christ to us. The truth in Christ saves us, turning our bodies from sin to real righteousness, from death to real life, from despair to hope, from lies to love.

Let us pray for all who are sick or sorrowing from the coronavirus or any illness or injury. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great**.


Let us pray for medical workers and researchers. Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

"KELC Flood/Hunger Relief."

These are difficult times for many people, and in the midst of Coronavirus and racial injustice and inequality, some of us feel helpless, not quite knowing what to do.

But there is a situation in which your help could mean saving hundreds of lives. In our companion synod (the Kenya Evangelical Lutheran Church), where they have also been facing many challenges due to Covid-19, unprecedented rainfall has caused two rivers to significantly flood, destroying communities.

We invite you to help us care for our neighbor by providing funds for food and basic life necessities. We are challenging the people of our synod to help us meet a goal of providing food for 1 month for the more than 300 people in the parishes affected by this flooding. Those who receive food supplies also will share with neighbors; which means that our gift could reach even more.

Hello, Allegheny Synod!

This is Pastor Curt Wingert, and I serve Salem Lutheran in Aaronsburg and St. John's Lutheran in Millheim. I am also part of the Allegheny Synod Stewardship team. As part of the stewardship team, we have been sharing our personal stewardship stories with you. God has called you and I to be caretakers, stewards of this wonderful creation.

This pandemic has opened the eyes of the congregations that I serve and brought us closer together to serve our neighbors and to be good stewards of what God has given us and to be good stewards of what we have.

St. John's has a childhood center and has twelve employees. Back in March, we had to close our childhood center because of COVID-19 and until certain restrictions were lifted. During this time, the congregational council was committed to making sure the childhood center staff was paid. Because they did not want the staff to go without. Without having income coming in from the childhood center for eight weeks and some financial guidance from the congregational council, the staff received their paychecks.

Also, during this time, Salem and St. John's has partnered with the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank to bring food to those in need in our communities. Every two weeks, a food distribution is held at one of the churches. Each family receives a box of dry goods, a box of produce, frozen meals, and frozen meat. These distributions have helped those who are financially struggling during this table and helped put food on the table for their families.

I know with the current situation your incomes might be affected. If and only if you are able, I ask that you mail your weekly offerings to your church. We are living in uncertain times, and even though some of us are not gathered in our sanctuaries at this time, your congregation still has ministries to support and bills to pay.

During this pandemic, we have found new ways to be the church. May you find new and creative ways to be good stewards of God's beautiful creation.
